2024. This program includes prioritized projects for federal, state, local, and private funding over four years. New Tool Allows Airports to View the Economic Impact of Facility Updates


An Aviation Economic Impact Calculator was recently unveiled, allowing Pennsylvania's 120 public-use airports to assess the economic impact

Pennsylvania airports benefit from over \$70 million annually from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, with state funding matching these federal investments. The aviation sector in Pennsylvania employs over 226,000 people, provides \$12.5 billion in payroll, and contributes \$34 billion annually to the economy.
